Texada Health Services Society is starting a community initiative to support persons with mental health and substance use challenges.


Our first step is to offer a foundational educational course designed for everyone, and ideal for public workplaces and community groups called **MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID.**

More Coyote Tales. . . White Out

I always made a habit of packing an overnight safety pack along with my gear whenever I'm out prospecting, or engaged in contract geology work. And I count my blessings that I did that one day and night North of 60.

The dawn of day back in '89 had me again in a chopper flying out to stake claims for a client. I had my pack sack, axe, hip chain and compass at the ready. I bailed out of the Bell 206 chopper at the start of the claim line ready to do the days staking.

The sky and snow was a palette of dark grays and icy blues, as I crunched along in the frozen snow with my bear claw snowshoes, tying orange flagging tape and blazing stunted spruce trees marking my claim line.

About halfway along my line of claims, it started snowing – light at first, but building heavier as the day wore on. I trekked along hoping the snow wouldn't get worse, but of course, it did. There comes a point where a decision is made to abandon the iob and hunker down for self preservation, and in the North that decision comes pretty quick.

I found a stunted spruce tree with a well of snow around its base. I jumped down into the hollow of the tree's base and used my snowshoe as a shovel to widen the space for more comfort and protection. I used the upper frozen crust of snow to build as a wind break. The wind and snow were howling now, a real white out, but in the well I was better protected.

In my safety pack I carried a can of peaches, a roll of toilet paper, a squirt bottle of stove oil, a box of wax coated matches, a roll of hav wire, tea and sugar cubes. I snapped off a pile of lower dead branches

off the tree and prepared to build a fire. It was difficult at first with my hands stiffening up and shaking from the cold, but with enough toilet paper and stove oil, I was able to get a small fire going. As I started thawing out, I opened the can of peaches and ate them using my knife. Afterwards, I filled the empty can with snow to use as a pot and hung it from a tree branch using some haywire. I added the tea and sugar to the pot and drank hot tea the rest of the evening. staying awake and keeping the fire going, best as I could to survive the night. It was cold.

May 2025

Stiff, cold and chilled, the morning arrived-I had survived. The new snow and ice were shimmering white crystals, almost blinding in the new days sun. The storm had blown itself out. My fire had burned itself down to permafrost and was still smouldering, as I climbed out of my hole onto a bed of fresh drifted snow—warming myself up with the new days sun.

It took some time to reorient myself in the blazing whiteness, as I continued on my claim line wearing sunglasses now. An hour or so later the chopper circled and landed to take me back to Mayo for a hot meal, rest and comfort. The chopper took off again pretty quick, as there were two more souls still out there. One of whom had frost bitten toes and was rushed off to Whitehorse, I found out later.

There's no messing around in the North and having a safety pack, rescue plan and being in shape are paramount when facing natures ill temper. I won't soon forget this 'overnight' and the "be prepared" lesson it taught me.

The Garden Club has a road trip planned for our May 21st meeting. On Wednesday at 2 p.m., we will be gathering at K&S Greens N Things, 5120 Leaper Rd. See you there.

This month **Sandy McCormick** writes about her favorite plant in the garden.

To some, it's a common weed. To others, it's an obnoxious, invasive species that takes over everything and spreads like wildfire in places where it doesn't belong. Even the deer don't like it. I'm referring to my favorite plant in the garden: **mint**. Not the strong, spicy kind, but the sweet, flavorful variety from which copious pots of mint tea are made.

There are many things I love about growing mint. For one, it keeps on giving. It's perennial and produces succulent leaves from now until late fall. Cut a leafy top off and two more grow. Give it a shady spot and lots of neglect and watch its runners spread. Its demands are few. Fertilizers not required. Water when you remember, but not too often. Weeding isn't necessary as it takes over everything anyway.

Another thing I like is that it can be

I thoroughly dry all mint sprigs for tea before using. The drying brings out the fullest flavor of the mint when steeped. Fresh mint I use with lamb, pesto, salads, pastas, potatoes and more. I appreciate that when mint dries, it lasts for many months at room temperature in a ziploc bag.

> This season I'm planning to harvest frequently and hope to grow enough to last all year. It's so much tastier than store-bought tea and is as delicious chilled on a warm afternoon as hot tea is in winter.

There are many varieties of mint. Peppermint and spearmint are the most

common, along with apple mint, chocolate mint and catmint (not as strong as catnip). Find the flavor you like the best. It adds fragrance to your garden and is also known to repel mosquitoes. Keep it in pots to contain its growth.





SEEKING VOLUNTEER LAKE MONITORS!

Help Protect Texada's Sticklebacks

Do you spend time at a lake on Texada in the spring and summer? Did you know that your observations can help protect freshwater habitats and sensitive wildlife, like the Texada stickleback species pairs?

The Invasive Species Council of BC is teaming up with Living Lakes Canada's National Lake Blitz Program to conduct lake monitoring on Texada Island from May to September.

Two types of volunteer monitoring:

Tier 1: Lake Biodiversity Stewards focus on lake biodiversity (frequency and timing is flexible);

Tier 2: Lake Health Stewards monitor biodiversity, air and water temperature, and water clarity—twice a month during May to Sept.

All volunteer materials and training are provided.

Darlene was the 'cool' auntie for her nephews who loved her powerful areen Dodge Charger with the 'peek-aboo' pop-up headlights and all the kids loved sitting on the center console right beside her (Yup, no seat belts back then). She also had a soft spot for animals. She happily helped friends by taking in dogs needing re-homing, and even tamed a black squirrel named Susie.

After Fred Bate's passing, Darlene continued to co-own the crane company and lovingly look after her aging mother. Over time, Darlene found love again with Fred McElroy. In 1994, a few years after losing her mother in 1991, Darlene and Fred embarked on two new adventures, first traveling across North America hauling with Freightliner, and secondly on August 6th, 1994, celebrating their wedding in North Vancouver. In 1998, Darlene and Fred moved their home-base to North Vancouver, where Darlene often stayed behind to look after her beloved Aunt Olive and Uncle Ken.

In late 2004, Darlene and Fred were searching the coastal area for a perfect paradise to enjoy their retirement. In January 2005, they purchased their new home in Van Anda. Here Darlene began planting her Dahlias, roses and other favourite plants. She enjoyed touring around with Fred, exploring the island, watching the sunset above the waves and, of course,

Texada Museum Musings....Texada Action Now

In 1982 Texada faced a critical challenge when the Greater Vancouver Regional District proposed dumping city garbage on our island. With virtually 100% citizens' opposition to this plan a response group, **Texada Action Now (TAN)**, was quickly formed to fight back.

The interesting and exciting story of TAN's and Texada's success was told in the April 2016 issue of Express Lines (to be reprinted here next month by request).

TAN was established to be a voice for Texada. Its initial achievements encouraged the committee to continue as a watchdog for issues that affect the island. All Texadans are automatically members. There are no regular meetings. If something comes up "...we will deal with it quickly, get rid of it and go to sleep till the next issue arises," says Chuck Childress, one of the founders.

TAN has intervened in many concerns facing the island over the last 43 years. In most cases the community has "come out of the woodwork" to rise to the occasion. For TAN to take up a cause there has to be "overwhelming community support," says Chuck.

When the Ministry of Forests planned using herbicides to kill bracken ferns at Pocahontas Bay, TAN bid on the contract. Their "goofy idea" was simply manual clearing. The project inspired dozens of volunteers of all ages to turn out to slash the ferns.

In 1986 with TAN support Texada passed a referendum banning use of herbicides and pesticides on public lands - a first of its kind in BC!

In 2008 the proposed LNG terminal at Blubber Bay prompted TAN to fly in reporters for a media tour of Coho Point. TAN helped mobilize several environmental groups and the project was cancelled.

In 1982 TAN lobbied the Regional District to set aside land to create the Marble Bay Bluff Park. It supported our high school when closure was threatened and lobbied BC Ferries for the triangular ferry route to Comox (cancelled during Covid). More recently in 2021 TAN demanded TELUS restore cell phone service to parts of the island.

Chuck says, "TAN is there for you." Its influence over the years has been an affirmation of Texada's independence and values in the face of continuing pressures from "the outside world."



January 27, 1941–March 31, 2025

K nud Rasmussen, 84, of Gillies Bay, BC, died peacefully at home on March 31, 2025.

Knud was born on the coldest night of the year in Lyngby, Denmark, on January 27, 1941, to Else and Henrik Rasmussen. At age 11, Knud started working as a delivery boy for a bakery, but he really wanted to be a farmer and at 14 he left school to apprentice as a dairyman. In 1959, he left Denmark to work on a farm in Canada, but on the crossing a fellow Dane (Martin Bode), convinced Knud to come north to Yellowknife instead. Upon his arrival, he worked at the Giant and Tundra gold mines where he participated on the Mine Rescue Team and First Aid. In 1969, Knud won the Caribou Carnival Strong Man Competition by carrying 1000 lbs of flour over 50 feet. In 1970, he



started Knud Rasmussen Drilling and Blasting Ltd. through which he did most of the blasting work in downtown Yellowknife in the 70's and 80's (including a malfunctioning vault at the CIBC bank!) without a single insurance claim. He also collared the Robertson (Con) and Lupin mineshafts, drilled and blasted at many mine sites, prospected and mined his own small high-grade gold properties, and operated/built several rock quarries. Later, he joined the diamond rush, including putting in a winter road and blasting the first bulk sample at Snap Lake, which became Canada's 3rd diamond mine. In 2013, Knud was made an Honorary Member of the NWT & Nunavut Chamber of Mines. Knud was highly respected in the north and will be remembered for his integrity and hard work.

In 1963, Knud married Rita Daniels, the mother of his three eldest children, who predeceased him in 1971. In 1980, Knud married Roxanna Ralston, the mother of his two youngest children. After 45 years of working in the north, Knud retired to Texada Island with Roxanna. Knud loved flying his ultra-light airplanes out of the Texada Airport and was very interested in development of the airport, serving for many years on the airport advisory committee. He also volunteered for the Royal Canadian Legion, the Texada Aerospace Camp, and the Texada Health Centre.

Knud is lovingly remembered by his wife, Roxanna; five children: Blake, Melody, Joy, Kirsten, and Will; six grandchildren; and, three great-grandchildren. He was predeceased by his parents; his brother, Fritz; and, Rita. Knud felt he had lived a long and full life, and he was ready to leave on his own terms. The family is grateful for the excellent care provided to him by the health care team on Texada, which enabled him to live life fully until his passing.

A reception will be held at the Royal Canadian Legion at 1 pm on June 7. In lieu of flowers, please consider a donation to The Cancer Support Group on Texada Island.

When Should I Call 911 on Texada?



Some Texada Island residents have expressed hesitation about calling 9-1-1 for an ambulance, especially late at night concerned that, without ferry service, access to hospital care might be out of reach.

We want to reassure you: Emergency medical services are committed to providing emergency medical care, no matter the time or day.

If you need to be transported to a hospital, BCEHS has several options available — even after regular ferry hours. Depending on your condition, you may be transported by air ambulance or water taxi. While ferry callouts are no longer part of the emergency response system, Texada now benefits from a faster, more reliable marine transport service: Access Point Marine. This service can bring paramedics to the island and transport patients to Qathet General Hospital.

In many cases, the local ambulance crew hands over care to the paramedics

arriving by water taxi, allowing the ambulance to return to service quickly.

Here's something many residents may not know because of Texada's remote location, helicopters aren't limited to trauma cases. They can also be dispatched for serious medical conditions when time is critical.

Still unsure whether to call 9-1-1? You can always call 8-1-1 — a free, confidential health advice line where registered nurses can help you assess your symptoms and guide you on what to do next.

No matter the hour or the circumstance, help is available. Don't wait — call 9-1-1.

Come in and check out the new additions. They are located on the back wall of the library near the back door.—Pam Kenny



DIRECTOR'S REPORT, Area D

The 2025 qRD Financial Plan has been approved and our property tax rate in area D is lower than first expected.

RESIDENTIAL TAX RATES

The residential property tax rate per \$100,000 in assessed value is \$211.01, a three per cent rise over the 2024 rate of \$204.89. Earlier drafts of the budget had higher tax rates, but some reductions in general admin costs brought costs down. In total, we will be paying \$1,233,395 in taxes across all categories of properties: residential, utilities, major and light industries, business/commercial, managed forest, recreation/non-profit and farms.

PROPERTY ASSESSMENTS

Property assessments are up this year. In total, properties on Texada are assessed at \$440,524,263, up from \$409,965,212 in 2024. The average home value is also up, to \$428,419 from \$401,876 last year. The owner of an average-priced home paid \$823.40 in property taxes in 2024, increasing to \$904.01 this year. You can guesstimate your residential property taxes by multiplying the tax rate (\$211.01) by the number of \$100,000s in your assessed value.

qRD's NEW RESOURCE RECOVERY CENTRE

A big driver of this year's \$17 million operating budget and \$6.8 million capital plan is the qRD's new Resource Recovery Centre. This isn't a surprise, and thankfully, construction and related capital costs are largely complete, so this will be less of an issue in coming years. Unfortunately, related debtfinancing costs will be with us for several decades.

TEXADA ISLAND'S SERVICES FUNDING

Funding is in place for Texada's six RD services: the Health Centre, Airport, Recreation Commission, VA dock, road rescue and Heritage. On-island this year, the showers have been upgraded at Shelter Point Park, the tennis courts will be refinished and sub-floor structural work will take place at the Community Hall. The concession is expected to open later this month. Built into all budgets are a three per cent inflation factor and a 10-15 per cent increase in insurance costs.

If all of that isn't enough, there are also taxes from other agencies which appear on our tax bills. These include schools, police, BC Assessment Authority and the Regional Hospital District, where the residential property tax rate is down by 56 cents to \$34.60.

- 1. Continued safe and secure supply of water with superior attention to customer service and particular attention to leaks.
- 2. Beginning a capital replacement plan and planning for the longer-term future with respect to safety, sustainability, and thrift.
- 3. Continued planning for water treatment to comply with health standards;

including local materials, labour, and maintenance issues in the most cost effective way possible.

- 4. Maintain a modest, thrifty approach to taxes and fees, appropriate for a system with relatively few ratepayers.
- 5. Monitor the health of the watershed and water works including the effects of changing climate patterns.

If you have questions or comments, they would be welcome at the meeting.

GILLIES BAY & VAN ANDA FIRE DEPARTMENTS

This is a very important reminder to all of our residents that we are now moving into a dryer, warmer season and this comes with more risks to our grasslands and forests.

Already this week, we have had a significant brushfire that we attended to for several hours, and as is quite common, it re-ignited the next evening. It is surprising perhaps to some that as wet as the ground appears to be in many areas, we are still at risk for fires starting due to discarded cigarettes, barbeque coals, brush burning and accidental ignition from sparks or equipment. Please be diligent and do not hesitate to call if you have fire concerns.

A reminder—**May 15 to October 15**, there is a total ban on open burning for the island, including burning barrels. Dates my be changed due to fire conditions. Campfires are still allowed on Texada Island, unless the BC Wildfire Service determines otherwise and mandates a total, complete ban. Thanks again to all of our residents and businesses for donating to our fund for the wildfire fighting Kubota. It has arrived at the Gillies Bay Fire Hall and we hope to have an official welcome open house to the community to come and view it after we finish outfitting it and preparing it for our wildland fire fighting needs.

Also of note, the **Van Anda Fire Department** has purchased a used heavy duty rescue truck which will also double as a wildland fire fighting vehicle with self contained water and pump.

The Gillies Bay and Van Anda Fire Departments wish to thank Texada Island Inn for offering coffee, pizza and sandwiches to our firefighters during a recent fire.

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VAN ANDA IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

Hello Texada! Here are some notes on recent events:

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING was held on Saturday April 26. Reports, financials, and draft minutes are available on the website and at the office.

BURN BAN <u>begins May 15</u> unless conditions cause the date to be brought forward. Usual annual dates for the burn ban are May 15 – Oct 15, burning barrels included. Campfires are ok at this point.

From the VAID "Fire Regulations Bylaw No. 184" on Open Air Fires: (shortened for readability) 23. A fire in the "open air" means a fire out-of-doors, not in an incinerator, and excludes campfires. A competent Person will supervise, keep under control, and ensure that any equipment necessary for fire control is available. Fire located at least 3 m (10 feet) from any grass, shrubbery, or wooden fence; and 6 m (20 feet) from any building. 24. Backyard Burning (Category 2). A Category 2 open fire is a pile up to 2 metres high and 3 metres wide or burns stubble or grass over an area less than 2,000 square metres (½ acre).

VAID's Fire Restrictions website page has links to the Bylaw as well as Coastal Fire Bans and a map with Fire Danger Rating for BC. vananda-id.ca/fire-restrictions/

WATER RESTRICTIONS: Stage One begins May 15 and Stage 2 on Jul 1.

Briefly, **Stage 1** restricts lawn watering to once per week, watering is done on odd or even dates based on house number, and filling of pools only allowed at specific times.

Stage 2 further restricts lawn watering to

one hour a day once per week and washing of outside surfaces to specific situations.

If **Stage 3** is called, there is no lawn watering, pool filling, or washing of vehicles, boats, or outside surfaces.

EV Charger at Shelter Point

The Regional District (qRD) received grant funding for two electric vehicle charging stations – one at Shelter Point Park, and the other Klah Ah Men Lund Gazebo Regional Park.

Costs of about \$80,000 for both will be covered through the Charged for Change program, in partnership with Earth Day Canada, Aviva Canada, for the purchase, supply and installation of two dual-plug Flo CoRe+ MAX Level 2 Charging Stations.

The cost estimates include a single-pedestal Level 2 charging station with dual-plugs, a new hydro-pole if required, new overhead lighting and all signage and protective infrastructure for the charging station.

FLO's Level 2 chargers are compatible with major North American EV models (either directly or with a connector), and are accessible by downloading the <u>FLO App</u> or other ChargePoint roaming partner apps (EVgo, Ionity, Allego, Innogy, EVBox and others) or as a guest user by providing an email address and credit card number. The Flo EV charging station communicates wirelessly through a built-in cellular gateway, so no wired or fixed internet connection is required.

Revenue generated from the use of the EV charging station will cover electricity costs and, depending on usage, may also cover the annual fees for the service. Expenses over and above revenue will be paid from the Regional Parks Services budget. Surplus revenue generated from the EV charging station will be returned to the Regional Parks Operating budget.
